





#### A few weeks ago, I was a guest on <u>'The Design Talk'</u>, a podcast hosted by Ottawa based interior designer and owner of <u>LPD Studio</u>, Priscille Joseph.

It was such an engaging talk, on the subject of sustainability and what that means when you are an architect practising your craft. As Grounded turns 10 this year, it also gave me the chance to recap our journey thus far.

As a firm, we have spoken often about the need to **reconnect architecture with nature** and Priscille began the interview with asking me what that meant in the context of our work. My architecture is centered on the idea of connection to nature, as a design element and for reasons of sustainability. Through our buildings, we aim to quietly co-exist with the landscape rather than be a grave intervention or a loud statement.

She asked me for ideas on how someone could make **sustainable changes in their home**, when they didn't know where to start. I suggested 3 tips for those who want to make a conscious start. These are:

- Be a conscious buyer,
- Try DIY composting at home, and
- Say no to single use plastic.

Finally, she asked me what a client could expect while working with an architect who has a sustainable focus. My truthful answer to this was- 'More work.' A design project has to be a real partnership between the client and the architect. Clients have to be clear in their expectations and budgets. I genuinely feel that if you are working with an architect with a sustainable focus, the client has to be open minded. Architects will present material options that reduce waste and promote recycling. They will also bring to the table options for plumbing fittings and electrical fittings that are more efficient. Overall, a sustainable approach should save you money in the long run and really improve your well-being.

I also spoke at length about how we are starting to offer our design services in Singapore as the next phase fro Grounded.
